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Home Institution Selection Process

Determining the path forward to securing a home institution

- 1. Identify list of all potential institutions
- 2. Open Letter of Inquiry process
- Planning Committee members score LOIs on a rubric
 > Have clarifying conversations w/ institutions as needed
- 4. Planning Committee agrees on a best-fit partner

IF multiple options are identified, subcommittee continues process:

1. Invite smaller # to complete an RFP

> Have clarifying conversations w/ institutions as needed

2. Working group scores RFPs with shared rubric and determines best-fit institution



Home Institution Scoring Criteria

	Criteria	Explanation
%	Flexible support	Understands and has the capacity to fully realize the power of a citywide early childhood research alliance, including its need for self-governance, flexibility, transparency, and participatory ways of working.
%	Cross-sector representation	Maintains a broad focus to support work across all sectors of the early childhood system in Chicago, including early care, education, home visiting, and maternal & child health
%	Operations Backbone	Provides infrastructure to support functions such as: contracting, compliance, data sharing and use agreements, institutional review board approvals, office and meeting space, payroll, benefits, IT support, partnerships/MOUs.
%	Outreach engine	Shares support for fundraising and bolsters connections to funders; capacity and expertise to uplift communication/dissemination.
%	Mission alignment	Leadership brings energy, enthusiasm and an entrepreneurial spirit to the undertaking; and has demonstrated a focus on equity and inclusion.
%	Public trust	A stable and durable institution that has earned the trust of Chicago's early childhood researchers, policymakers, practitioners, communities, and families and is well-positioned to act as a hub and convener across these groups.
%	Broad reach	Maintains and facilitates strong connections to state and national work.
%	Research Expertise & Capacity	Is experienced in and committed to both conducting rigorous and actionable early childhood research and supporting partners to do so.

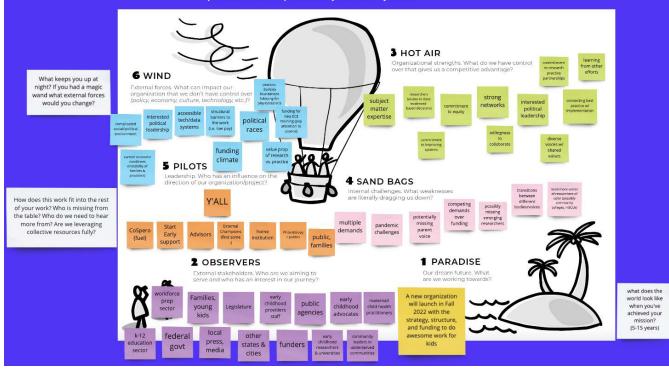

EC-REACH staff should consider the following factors when recruiting Research Advisory Council members.

Representation	Various indicators of diversity: • Gender • Socioeconomic status • Race/Ethnicity • Community influence • Previous engagement • Native language • Neighborhood • Age + age of children • Differently abled/neuro-diverse	Access	 Options for securing diverse community voice: Nomination process where CBOs invite community members with specific perspectives/experiences on an issue An open (simple) application process where community members can opt into an advisory council Conduct targeted community outreach to find the voices needed (not just those readily available or already connected) In lieu of an application process, host open advisory meetings that are shared broadly with the target community
Engagement	 Considerations for more equitable engagements include: Vary the time of day and consider hours for those without flexible work schedules Provide transportation and childcare options Host engagements at trusted community locations and/or consider virtual options Provide community members with a stipend for their time Ensure multi-language translation is available Take time at each engagement to build relationships across potential silos Include background information or training as necessary to bridge knowledge & experience gaps Embed feedback loops to ensure that external engagement is meaningful 	Process	 Considerations for what to include when seeking community insights: Before a research project – define what's on the table, share examples of past impact (why their feedback matters), describe a vision of desired impact (potential pros and cons of outcomes), identify bright spots, probe for current pain points During a research project – touch base at regular intervals to share initial findings and anticipate any potential unintended consequences After a research project – follow up specifically with those engaged to say thank you and share the outcome of the project including potential policy or practice implications; use straightforward, jargon-free language

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Research Values & Criteria

EC-REACH supports research that is:

Value	Criteria
Rigorous	Research will meet high standards in qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methodologies and will be committed to an open science practice
Responsive	Research will be solutions oriented and provide timely insights that are responsive to the pressing issues facing early childhood policy and practice
Equitable	Research will prioritize an equitable and asset-based approach that addresses the bias of power and privilege and engages community perspectives (especially those from historically disadv antaged and underrepresented groups) to shape the entire research process.
Collaborative	Research will be conceptualized, designed, and implemented through balanced and pre-determined collaboration among research partners, policy partners, practitioners, community leaders, and families.
Inclusive	Engage researchers, policymakers, and practitioners who approach their work from a variety of perspectives; we will be especially intentional about including researchers from historically disadvantaged and underrepresented groups as so to develop a more inclusive pipeline for the systemic work.
Contextualized	Research will be grounded in Chicago's social, economic, and political context.
Accessible	Communicate findings to diverse audiences (locally, state-wide, and nationally), using a variety of mediums, to encourage the use of research to inform meaningful change in policy and practice.



Research Agenda Process

Data Access & Sharing Pillars

EC-REACH should not collect or manage administrative / accountability data or data dashboards, but should instead:

Pillar	Explanation
Data Type	Support research studies that use administrative data, and studies that include primary data collection including qualitative data.
Data Access	Facilitate access to existing early childhood data, including administrative and accountability data that may include providing language and templates for partners to put data use agreements in place and/or establishing master data sharing agreements with one or more agencies/organizations. Subject to authorization by data owners.
Data Sharing	Facilitate access to a growing body of new early childhood data by facilitating the sharing of data, documentation, and prepared administrative data for analysis among current and past EC-REACH partners.
Data Linking	 Facilitate the ability to link early childhood data from various sources, including via streamlined/expedited access to the CECIDS dataset. CECIDS will provide integrated data, data modeling, and a secure research environment for EC-REACH. EC-REACH projects will identify the need for improved and additional data to incorporate into CECIDS
Review and Approvals	Adhere to home institution IRB approval process and support partner IRB approval processes, including supporting approvals by data owners.
