## **2SHB 1550** - S COMM AMD

- 1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:
- 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.300
  4 RCW to read as follows:
  - (1) The intent of the legislature is to continue and rename transitional kindergarten as the transition to kindergarten program and that the program be established in statute with the goal of assisting eligible children in need of additional preparation to be successful kindergarten students in the following school year. The transition to kindergarten program is not part of the state's program of basic education under Article IX of the state Constitution.
  - (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall administer the transition to kindergarten program and shall adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW for the administration of, and the allocation of state funding for the transition to kindergarten program. The rules developed by the office of the superintendent of public instruction must include, at a minimum, the following requirements for a transition to kindergarten program:
- 19 (a) A limitation on program enrollment to eligible children. 20 Eligible children include only those who:
- 21 (i) Have been determined to benefit from additional preparation 22 for kindergarten; and
- (ii) Are at least four years old by August 31st of the year they enroll in the transition to kindergarten program.
- 25 (b) Except for children who have been excused from participation 26 by their parents or legal guardians, a requirement that the 27 Washington kindergarten inventory of developing skills as established 28 by RCW 28A.655.080 be administered to all children enrolled in a 29 transition to kindergarten program at the beginning of the child's 28 enrollment in the program and at least one more time during the 29 school year.
- 32 (c) A requirement that all eligible children enrolled in a 33 transition to kindergarten be assigned a statewide student identifier Code Rev/CC:jlb 1 S-2385.1/23

1 and that the transition to kindergarten program be considered a separate class or course for the purposes of data 2 reporting requirements in RCW 28A.320.175. 3

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- (d) A requirement that school districts conduct a local child care and early learning needs assessment prior to beginning or expanding a transition to kindergarten program that considers the existing availability and affordability of early childhood education and assistance programs, head start programs, and licensed child care centers and family home providers in the region. School districts may use the data available through the regionalized data dashboard maintained by the department of children, youth, and families for purposes of conducting the needs assessment required by this subsection or any other sources the school districts deem 14 appropriate.
- (e)(i) A process for the department of children, youth, and 15 16 families to conduct site visits of a school district offering a transition to kindergarten program and provide feedback to the 17 district related to: 18
  - (A) Best practices for site readiness of facilities that will be used for the program;
- 21 (B) Developmentally appropriate curricula that might assist 22 districts in maintaining high quality programs; and
- 23 (C) Professional development opportunities available through the department, organizations contracting with the department 24 25 educational service districts.
  - (ii) Site readiness visits by the department of children, youth, and families allowed under this subsection does not give the department any licensing or authorizing authority of school districts or schools.
- (f) A prohibition of school districts from charging tuition or 30 31 other fees to state-funded eligible children for enrollment in a 32 transition to kindergarten program.
- (g) A prohibition of school districts from establishing a policy 33 of excluding an eligible child due only to the presence of a 34 35 disability.
- 36 (3) (a) Funding for the transition to kindergarten program is based on the school district's reported full-time equivalent 37 headcount of eligible children enrolled in the program and calculated 38 39 according to the distribution formula established under RCW 40 28A.150.260 (4)(a), (5), (6), (8), (10)(a) and (b), and the Code Rev/CC:jlb 2 S-2385.1/23

- allocation established under RCW 28A.160.150 through 28A.150.180. A transition to kindergarten child must be counted as a kindergarten student for purposes of the funding calculations referenced in this subsection, but must be reported separately. This funding is not part of the program of basic education and must be expended only for the support of operating a transition to kindergarten program.
  - (b) By December 1st of each odd-numbered year, the office of the superintendent of public instruction must make data available to the legislature that includes the number of state-funded eligible children enrolled in a transition to kindergarten program operated by school districts in the current school year.
- 12 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.225.160 and 2009 c 380 s 3 are each amended to 13 read as follows:
  - (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section and otherwise provided by law, it is the general policy of the state that the common schools shall be open to the admission of all persons who are five years of age and less than ((twenty-one)) 21 years residing in that school district. Except as otherwise provided by law or rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction, districts may establish uniform entry qualifications, including but not limited to birthdate requirements, for admission to kindergarten and first grade programs of the common schools. Such rules may provide for exceptions based upon the ability, or the need, or both, of an individual student, but these exceptions may not be used as a basis for developing a new basic education program. For the purpose of complying with any rule adopted by the superintendent of public instruction that authorizes a preadmission screening process as a prerequisite to granting exceptions to the uniform qualifications, a school district may collect fees to cover expenses incurred in the administration of any preadmission screening process: PROVIDED, That in so establishing such fee or fees, the district shall adopt rules for waiving and reducing such fees in the cases of those persons whose families, by reason of their low income, would have difficulty in paying the entire amount of such fees.
  - (2) A student who meets the definition of a child of a military family in transition under Article II of RCW 28A.705.010 shall be permitted to continue enrollment at the grade level in the common schools commensurate with the grade level of the student when

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- 1 attending school in the sending state as defined in Article II of RCW
- 2 28A.705.010, regardless of age or birthdate requirements."

On page 1, line 4 of the title, after "program;" strike the remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.225.160; and adding a new section to chapter 28A.300 RCW."

 $\underline{\text{EFFECT:}}$  Strikes the provisions of the underlying bill and replaces it with the following:

- (1) States that the intent of the legislature is to continue and rename Transitional Kindergarten as the Transition to Kindergarten program and this program is not part of the state's program of basic education under Article IX of the State Constitution.
- (2) Directs the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) to administer the Transition to Kindergarten program.
- (3) Requires OSPI to adopt rules for the administration of and the allocation of state funding for the program and specifies minimum requirements for the OSPI rules.
- (4) Provides a funding formula for the Transition to Kindergarten program.
- (5) Directs OSPI to make data available each odd-numbered year to the Legislature that includes the number of state-funded eligible children enrolled in a Transition to Kindergarten program.
- (6) States that individual exceptions for admission to kindergarten and first grade programs of the common schools may not be used as a basis for developing a new basic education program.

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
