## **2SHB 1550** - S COMM AMD

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.300
4 RCW to read as follows:

5 (1) The intent of the legislature is to continue and rename 6 transitional kindergarten as the transition to kindergarten program 7 and that the program be established in statute with the goal of 8 assisting eligible children in need of additional preparation to be 9 successful kindergarten students in the following school year. The 10 transition to kindergarten program is not part of the state's 11 statutory program of basic education under RCW 28A.150.200.

12 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 13 administer the transition to kindergarten program and shall adopt 14 rules under chapter 34.05 RCW for the administration of, and the allocation of state funding for, the transition to kindergarten 15 16 program. Initial rules, which include expectations for school 17 districts and public schools transitioning existing programs to the 18 new requirements established in this section must be adopted in time 19 for the 2023-24 school year, and permanent rules must be adopted by 20 the beginning of the 2024-25 school year. The rules must include, at 21 minimum, the following requirements for a transition to а 2.2 kindergarten program:

(a) (i) A limitation on program enrollment to eligible children.Eligible children include only those who:

(A) Have been determined to benefit from additional preparationfor kindergarten; and

(B) Are at least four years old by August 31st of the school yearthey enroll in the transition to kindergarten program.

(ii) School districts and public schools may prioritize families with the lowest incomes and children most in need for additional preparation to be successful in kindergarten when enrolling eligible children in a transition to kindergarten program;

1 (iii) Access to the transition to kindergarten program does not 2 constitute an individual entitlement for any particular child.

3 (b) Except for children who have been excused from participation 4 by their parents or legal guardians, a requirement that the 5 Washington kindergarten inventory of developing skills as established 6 by RCW 28A.655.080 be administered to all eligible children enrolled 7 in a transition to kindergarten program at the beginning of the 8 child's enrollment in the program and at least one more time during 9 the school year.

10 (c) A requirement that all eligible children enrolled in a 11 transition to kindergarten program be assigned a statewide student 12 identifier and that the transition to kindergarten program be 13 considered a separate class or course for the purposes of data 14 reporting requirements in RCW 28A.320.175.

(d) (i) A requirement that a local child care and early learning 15 16 needs assessment is conducted before beginning or expanding a 17 transition to kindergarten program that considers the existing availability and affordability of early learning providers, such as 18 the early childhood education and assistance programs, head start 19 programs, and licensed child care centers and family home providers 20 21 in the region. Data available through the regionalized data dashboard maintained by the department of children, youth, and families or any 22 23 other appropriate sources may be used to conduct the needs assessment required by this section. 24

(ii) The office of the superintendent of public instruction, in collaboration with the department of children, youth, and families, shall develop statewide coordinated eligibility, recruitment, enrollment, and selection best practices and provide technical assistance to those implementing a transition to kindergarten program to support connections with local early learning providers.

31 (iii) Nothing in this section prohibits school districts and 32 public schools from blending or colocating a transition to 33 kindergarten program with other early learning programs.

(e) (i) A requirement that school districts and public schools
 adhere to guidelines, as developed by the office of the
 superintendent of public instruction, related to:

37 (A) Best practices for site readiness of facilities that are used38 for the program;

39 (B) Developmentally appropriate curricula that might assist in 40 maintaining high quality programs; and

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(C) Professional development opportunities.

(ii) The office of the superintendent of public instruction must 2 develop a process for conducting site visits of a school district or 3 public school offering a transition to kindergarten program and 4 provide feedback on elements listed in this subsection (2)(e). 5

6 (f) A prohibition on charging tuition or other fees to statefunded eligible children for enrollment in a transition 7 to kindergarten program. 8

(g) A prohibition on establishing a policy of excluding 9 an eligible child due only to the presence of a disability. 10

11 (3) (a) Funding for the transition to kindergarten program must be 12 based on the following:

(i) The distribution formula established under RCW 28A.150.260 13 14 (4)(a), (5), (6), (8), and (10)(a) and (b), calculated using the actual number of annual average full-time equivalent eligible 15 children enrolled in the program. A transition to kindergarten child 16 17 must be counted as a kindergarten student for purposes of the funding 18 calculations referenced in this subsection, but must be reported 19 separately.

(ii) The distribution formula developed in RCW 20 28A.160.150 21 through 28A.160.192, calculated using reported ridership for eligible children enrolled in the program. 22

(b) Funding provided for the transition to kindergarten program 23 is not part of the state's statutory program of basic education under 24 25 RCW 28A.150.200 and must be expended only for the support of 26 operating a transition to kindergarten program.

27 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.225.160 and 2009 c 380 s 3 are each amended to 28 read as follows:

(1) Except as provided in subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)\right)$  (3) of this section 29 30 and otherwise provided by law, it is the general policy of the state that the common schools shall be open to the admission of all persons 31 who are five years of age and less than ((twenty-one)) 21 years 32 residing in that school district. Except as otherwise provided by law 33 or rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction, 34 districts may establish uniform entry qualifications, including but 35 not limited to birthdate requirements, for admission to kindergarten 36 and first grade programs of the common schools. Such rules may 37 provide for <u>individualized</u> exceptions based upon the ability, or the 38 need, or both, of an individual student. Nothing in this section 39 Code Rev/CC:lel 3

1 <u>authorizes school districts, public schools, or the superintendent of</u> 2 <u>public instruction to create state-funded programs based on entry</u> 3 <u>qualification exceptions except as otherwise expressly provided by</u> 4 law.

(2) For the purpose of complying with any rule adopted by the 5 6 superintendent of public instruction that authorizes a preadmission 7 screening process as a prerequisite to granting individualized exceptions to the uniform entry qualifications, a school district may 8 collect fees to cover expenses incurred in the administration of any 9 preadmission screening process: PROVIDED, That in so establishing 10 such fee or fees, the district shall adopt rules for waiving and 11 12 reducing such fees in the cases of those persons whose families, by reason of their low income, would have difficulty in paying the 13 entire amount of such fees. 14

15 (((2))) (3) A student who meets the definition of a child of a 16 military family in transition under Article II of RCW 28A.705.010 17 shall be permitted to continue enrollment at the grade level in the 18 common schools commensurate with the grade level of the student when 19 attending school in the sending state as defined in Article II of RCW 20 28A.705.010, regardless of age or birthdate requirements.

21 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The department of children, youth, and 22 families must make administrative changes to better align early childhood education and assistance program implementation with state-23 24 funded early learning programs serving three through five-year old 25 children offered by school districts and public schools. The department must submit a report, in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, of 26 the administrative changes to the appropriate committees of the 27 28 legislature by July 1, 2024.

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(2) This section expires August 30, 2025.

30 Sec. 4. RCW 43.88C.010 and 2022 c 219 s 2 are each amended to 31 read as follows:

(1) The caseload forecast council is hereby created. The council shall consist of two individuals appointed by the governor and four individuals, one of whom is appointed by the chairperson of each of the two largest political caucuses in the senate and house of representatives. The chair of the council shall be selected from among the four caucus appointees. The council may select such other officers as the members deem necessary.

1 (2) The council shall employ a caseload forecast supervisor to 2 supervise the preparation of all caseload forecasts. As used in this 3 chapter, "supervisor" means the caseload forecast supervisor.

(3) Approval by an affirmative vote of at least five members of 4 the council is required for any decisions regarding employment of the 5 6 supervisor. Employment of the supervisor shall terminate after each 7 term of three years. At the end of the first year of each three-year term the council shall consider extension of the supervisor's term by 8 one year. The council may fix the compensation of the supervisor. The 9 supervisor shall employ staff sufficient to accomplish the purposes 10 of this section. 11

(4) The caseload forecast council shall oversee the preparation of and approve, by an affirmative vote of at least four members, the official state caseload forecasts prepared under RCW 43.88C.020. If the council is unable to approve a forecast before a date required in RCW 43.88C.020, the supervisor shall submit the forecast without approval and the forecast shall have the same effect as if approved by the council.

(5) A councilmember who does not cast an affirmative vote for approval of the official caseload forecast may request, and the supervisor shall provide, an alternative forecast based on assumptions specified by the member.

(6) Members of the caseload forecast council shall serve without additional compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120 while attending sessions of the council or on official business authorized by the council. Nonlegislative members of the council shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

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(7) "Caseload," as used in this chapter, means:

30 (a) The number of persons expected to meet entitlement 31 requirements and require the services of public assistance programs, 32 state correctional institutions, state correctional noninstitutional 33 supervision, state institutions for juvenile offenders, the common 34 school system, long-term care, medical assistance, foster care, and 35 adoption support;

36 (b) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington 37 college bound scholarship program and are expected to attend an 38 institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.92.030;

39 (c) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington 40 college grant program under RCW 28B.92.200 and 28B.92.205 and are Code Rev/CC:lel 5 S-2590.1/23 expected to attend an institution of higher education as defined in
 RCW 28B.92.030; and

3 (d) The number of children who are eligible, as defined in RCW
4 43.216.505, to participate in, and the number of children actually
5 served by, the early childhood education and assistance program.

6 (8) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the temporary 7 assistance for needy families and the working connections child care 8 programs as a courtesy.

9 (9) By January 1, 2023, the caseload forecast council shall 10 present the number of individuals who are assessed as eligible for 11 and have requested a service through the individual and family 12 services waiver and the basic plus waiver administered by the 13 developmental disabilities administration as a courtesy. The caseload 14 forecast council shall be presented with the service request list as 15 defined in RCW 71A.10.020 to aid in development of this information.

16 (10) Beginning with the official forecast submitted in November 17 2022 and subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the caseload forecast council shall forecast the 18 19 number of individuals who are assessed as eligible for and have requested supported living services, a service through the core 20 21 waiver, an individual and family services waiver, and the basic plus 22 waiver administered by the developmental disabilities administration as a courtesy. The caseload forecast council shall be presented with 23 the service request list as defined in RCW 71A.10.020 to aid in 24 25 development of this information.

(11) As a courtesy, beginning with the official forecast submitted in November 2022, the caseload forecast council shall forecast the number of individuals who are expected to reside in state-operated living alternatives administered by the developmental disabilities administration.

31 (12) The caseload forecast council shall forecast youth 32 participating in the extended foster care program pursuant to RCW 33 74.13.031 separately from other children who are residing in foster 34 care and who are under eighteen years of age.

35 (13) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the number of 36 youth expected to receive behavioral rehabilitation services while 37 involved in the foster care system and the number of screened in 38 reports of child abuse or neglect.

1 (14) <u>The caseload forecast council shall forecast eligible</u> 2 <u>children participating in the transition to kindergarten program</u> 3 <u>under section 1 of this act.</u>

4 (15) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the 5 definitions provided in RCW 43.88.020 apply to this chapter.

6 ((<del>(15)</del>)) <u>(16)</u> During the 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, and beginning 7 with the November 2021 forecast, the caseload forecast council shall 8 produce an unofficial forecast of the long-term caseload for juvenile 9 rehabilitation as a courtesy."

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10 On page 1, line 4 of the title, after "program;" strike the 11 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.225.160 and 12 43.88C.010; adding a new section to chapter 28A.300 RCW; creating a 13 new section; and providing an expiration date."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Strikes the provisions of the underlying bill and replaces it with the following:

(1) States that the intent of the legislature is to continue and rename Transitional Kindergarten as the Transition to Kindergarten program and this program is not part of the state's statutory program of basic education under RCW 28A.150.200.

(2) Directs the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) to administer the Transition to Kindergarten program and specifies that initial rules must be adopted in time for the 2023-24 school year and permanent rules be adopted by the beginning of the 2024-25 school year.

(3) Requires OSPI to adopt rules for the administration of and the allocation of state funding for the program and specifies minimum requirements for the rules including: (a) A definition of eligible child and that access to this program does not constitute an individual entitlement; (b) a requirement to administer the Washington Kindergarten Inventory of Developing Skills twice a school year; (c) a requirement that enrolled children have a statewide student identifier; (d) a requirement that a local child care and early learning needs assessment is conducted and that OSPI and the Department of Children, Youth, and Families develop statewide coordinated eligibility, recruitment, enrollment, and selection best practices; (e) a requirement that school districts and public schools adhere to OSPI guidelines related to certain topics; (f) a prohibition on charging tuition or fees for the program; and (g) a prohibition on establishing a policy of excluding an eligible child due only to the presence of a disability.

(4) Provides a funding formula for the Transition to Kindergarten program based on the reported full-time equivalent of eligible

children in the program and calculated under certain portions of the prototypical school funding model.

(5) Directs the Caseload Forecast Council to forecast eligible children participating in the transition to kindergarten program.

(6) States that individualized exceptions for admission to kindergarten and first grade programs does not authorize school districts, public schools, or the superintendent of public instruction to create state-funded programs based on entry qualification exceptions except as otherwise expressly provided by law.

(7) Directs DCYF to make administrative changes to better align early childhood education and assistance program implementation with state-funded early learning programs serving three through five-year olds offered by school districts and public schools and requires a report by July 1, 2024.

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
