

Tips for Writing and/or Delivering Testimony

at ISBE's Fiscal Year 2025 (FY 2025) Budget Hearings

General Tips:

- 1. Oral testimony is being limited to three (3) minutes per person.
- 2. These notes are meant as a guide. Please be sure to personalize your own testimony with your own perspective.
- 3. Compose your testimony with an introduction, early childhood needs, the \$75 million increase budget ask and conclusion.
- 4. Integrate your own voice as much as possible, for variety and authenticity!

Introduction:

- I would like to thank the Board for the opportunity to speak to you today about the FY25 budget.
- I'm a (parent, teacher, early childhood provider, etc.). I would like to address supports for our state's youngest learners and how ISBE can meet their needs.
- Early childhood is important to me because ______.

Early Childhood Needs and Budget Ask:

Talk about immediate needs, specific to the next Illinois state budget (FY 2025):

- We are appreciative of the State Board's support for early childhood programs over the years. The block grant funds services for children prenatal to age five in schools and community-based programs.
- Unfortunately, we're still not close to equitably meeting the needs of kids and families across the state.
- We are asking ISBE to include in its FY25 budget proposal, at a minimum, a \$75 million increase for the Early Childhood Block Grant (ECBG).
- We would also like to ask ISBE to continue and grow the \$5 million investment started in FY24 to improve inclusion supports for children with disabilities and developmental delays, particularly children in child care, Head Start or other community-based programs.
- It's important these new resources both expand and strengthen our programs. ISBE should prioritize the following needs for the \$75 million investment:
 - Reducing inequities in salaries experienced by current educators working for programs operated by community-based organizations, and those working with infants and toddlers.
 - Expanding more half-day preschool slots into full-day slots and directing a higher percentage of funding to these settings and to 0-3 services. Our preschool learners and their families benefit from a full-day of learning and infants and toddlers in center-based care deserve a wealth of resources and supports.
 - o Ensuring programs have the supports and capacity to meet the diverse learning needs of young children.

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Additional Recommendations:

No need to include all of these points; pick and choose what feels right to you.

- We need to commit far more resources and attention to early childhood, a system that helps our state's young children to enter school prepared for success.
- We need to improve our systems of equitably allocating early childhood funding with an eye toward reaching children in priority populations. Key to this is having transparent, data-informed funding decisions.
- As we work to respond to the challenges in the early childhood field, we also need to keep in mind the big picture of our state's system of early care and education – a system that includes not only the State Board and its Early Childhood Block Grant, but other state agencies, programs, and funding streams.
- The Governor's Funding Commission report should be the map that will lead us to an improved early care and education system for all.

Conclusion:

- The early years of a child's life are incredibly crucial and grounding. It is important that we invest money into programs that will support their optimal growth.
- We hope ISBE will act boldly when putting together its FY25 budget request and focus
 their attention on how we can best help young children's development in the coming
 years.
