

What is Advocacy?

The Role of Advocates

Early Childhood Advocacy

Advocacy is supporting, defending, or arguing for a cause or idea in public to influence opinion, policy, and resource allocation.

Advocates work to bring about change by raising awareness, organizing campaigns, and engaging with policymakers and the public.

Advocacy in the early childhood education and child care (ECEC) space involves actively supporting and promoting the rights and needs of young children and their families.



Types of Advocacy

Self Advocacy

Individual Advocacy

Systemic Advocacy

Speaking up for yourself: expressing your needs, interests, and rights effectively.

Empowering others to assert their autonomy, personal voice, and rights.

Creating change for everyone: fixing the whole system so that it works better for everyone, not just for one person (i.e. laws, policies, and practices).

Public Awareness Advocacy

Spreading the word for change: raising attention and spreading information (i.e. events, campaigns, and media efforts).

Legislative Advocacy

Making laws work for people: influencing the creation and amendment of laws and policies. Including working with lawmakers, policy makers, and stakeholders.



Legislative Process

Convening

Legislators meet January-May

Bill Types

Appropriation: proposing budget items **Substantive**: proposing significant law change

Revisory: proposing amendments to

current laws

Shell/vehicle bills: placeholder for

legislation

Committees/Readings

Introducing bills and assigning them to committees, followed by debates and amendments.

Veto session

Legislative period to reconsider bills rejected

Lame duck session

Period after an election but before new officials take office, during which outgoing officials continue to serve and may address unfinished legislative business



Advocacy Targets

Decision Makers



State Legislators in the House and Senate



Influencers

Individuals or groups who have access to the decision-makers and who may be able to influence them. Influencers may become partners in the advocacy plan.

i.e. Associations, organizations, families, providers, ECEC experts and other professionals, faith-based groups, opinion leaders, the media, researchers, academics

What is happening with our state budget?


Need to pass a balanced budget every year



In order to pass a balanced budget annually, legislators must prioritize numerous objectives, often necessitating cuts in programs or maintaining current funding levels, advocates want to ensure early childhood remains a priority

New Agency Legislation



SB1/HB5451

Create a new undefined state agency focused on early childhood
Budget

New Department of Early Childhood: \$13.2 million appropriation



FY25 ECE Budget **Priorities**



Early Childhood Block Grant: \$75 million increase (11.1% increase from FY24)



Child Care: \$158.5 million increase (27.2% increase from FY24)



Early Intervention: \$40 million increase



IDHS Home Visiting: \$5 million increase (21.8% increase from FY24)



ECACE: \$60 million appropriation



New Department of Early Childhood: \$13.2 million appropriation

Take Action

Ask Your Legislator to Increase Funding for Early Childhood in FY25!



On February 21, Governor Pritzker announced his proposed Fiscal Year 2025 budget that includes exciting investments in the new Department of Early Childhood, year two of the Smart Start Illinois initiative, and other important early childhood programs. However, the proposal falls short in a few key areas, with insufficient investment in vital programs that bolster access to support for young children.

Investments in the new Department of Early Childhood and year two of Smart Start Illinois are BIG priorities for early childhood advocates. However, Illinois must increase funds for the entire early childhood education and care system and make the investments outlined in SB3814/ HB5782!

Tips in Crafting Your Elevator Pitch

- IDENTIFY YOUR GOAL
- START WITH YOUR NAME
- COMMUNICATE WHAT YOU'RE
 PASSIONATE ABOUT AND WHY
- IDENTIFY THE BARRIER OR PROBLEM
 THAT AFFECTS THIS PASSION
- USE STORYTELLING TO MAKE YOUR SPEECH MORE RELATABLE
- REINFORCE YOUR PASSION AND/OR YOUR ORGANIZATION'S REASON FOR ENGAGING IN THIS WORK
